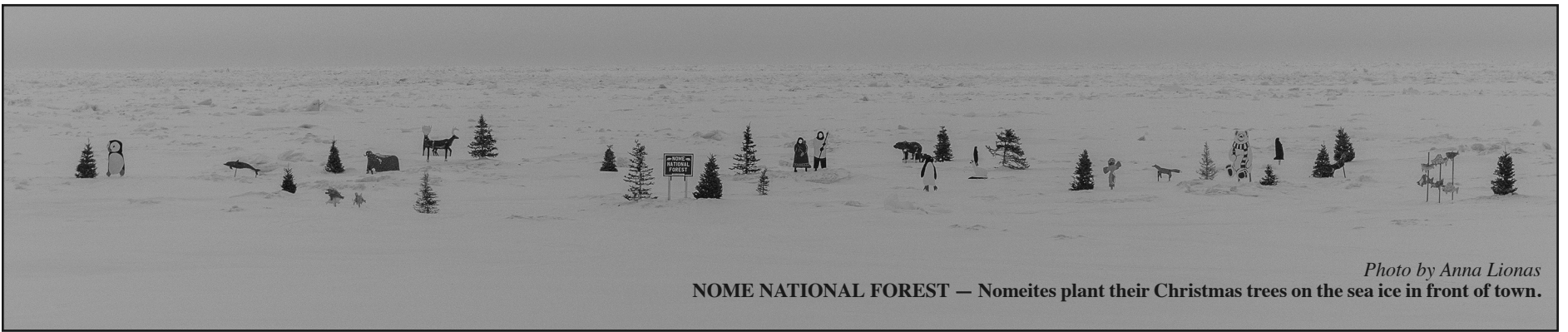

## Alaska Lt. Gov. ok's signature gathering for 2026 repeal of ranked choice voting, open primary

Less than four months after Alaska voters rejected a ballot measure to repeal Alaska's ranked choice voting and open primary system, the state's lieutenant governor has OK'd a new petition-gathering effort to repeal the system.

Lt. Gov. Nancy Dahlstrom announced on Monday that she had approved the first step in the process: certifying that the proposed ballot measure was in the proper form. This allows the sponsors to begin gathering signatures.

They will need to collect at least 34,099 signatures of registered voters, including minimum numbers of signatures in at least 30 of the 40 state House districts, to place the measure on the ballot in 2026.

Proponent Bernadette Wilson of Anchorage said it was important to get started early in the 2026 election cycle due to the large number of needed signatures. She is one of three primary sponsors, along with Judy Eledge of Anchorage and Ken McCarty of Eagle River.

Wilson pointed out that the 2024 ballot measure to repeal the voting system lost by a narrow margin — just 737 votes of 320,985 ballots cast.

Wilson said the sponsors feel good about their chances next time, saying that some voters were confused about what a yes or no vote meant on the question. She noted that opponents of repealing the system raised nearly \$15 million, compared with roughly \$150,000 raised by repeal supporters.

"When you look at that confusion,

when you look at the Alaskans who realize, now, 'Oh my goodness, it was \$15 million of outside money,' and realized that they were duped, I think we could come up with" the number of votes needed to win, Wilson said.

Wilson listed several reasons voters should support repeal, saying that the current system is "convoluted" and contributed to delays in the public knowing the outcomes of some elections.

If placed on the ballot, the measure would be the second approved by

Dahlstrom for 2026. She also approved a measure to reimpose limits in political donations. Supporters of that measure said they would like to see the Legislature head off that measure by passing a bill that is substantially similar this year, so that the limits would be in place for 2026.

## Hundreds rally at Alaska State Capitol as part of nationwide march focused on rights and democracy

*Similar Presidents Day protests took place in Petersburg, Ketchikan, Cordova, Palmer, Anchorage and Fairbanks, part of a nationwide day of action protesting the Trump administration*

A crowd of over 300 demonstrators rallied in front of the Alaska State Capitol on Monday, part of nationwide Presidents Day protests condemning President Donald Trump and his administration's actions as anti-democratic and illegal, particularly the recent firing of federal employees and treatment of marginalized groups.

Similar protests took place across the state, including in Petersburg, Ketchikan, Cordova, Palmer, Anchorage and Fairbanks, according to social media posts, as part of the 50501 movement, which stands for "50 states, 50 protests, 1 movement" protesting the Trump administration.

"Let today's protest help to reignite any flame in you that has gone out. Let the collective power of our community hold you up in these troubling and scary times," said Summer Christiansen, one of the organizers, to the crowd.

Demonstrators carried signs focused on actions of Elon Musk and the Department of Government Efficiency or DOGE, making sweeping cuts to federal agencies, programs and the workforce.

"People are scared; they're scared for their jobs," said one demonstrator carrying a sign saying "Alaska needs NOAA." "I think people are really reeling right now and scrambling to figure out what they're going to do."

As an employee of the National

Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in Alaska, they asked to remain anonymous due to fear of retaliation as the federal firings unfold. "My personal story, I spent nine years in grad school, five years in post doc. I've wanted to work for NOAA a long time," they said. "If I cared about money, I would have gone to Wall Street, but I care about our environment and our people. And NOAA provides a lot of services to Alaska, the rural and coastal communities here really get a lot of information from us, and I'm worried."

Ralliers called for protecting democracy, justice and equal rights for all, especially of minority groups like immigrants, LGBTQ youth, and transgender communities.

"Kids need health care," said Leslie Wood, holding a sign that read 'Protect Trans Rights' with her wife Jean Findley, of Juneau. "We have family members who are trans," added Findley. "So it was really life-saving and life enhancing for them to own their own gender, after having gender dysphoria, and they just really blossomed, you know, after that. I want everybody to be able to blossom and be themselves. Trans rights are everybody's rights, civil rights," she said.

Other demonstrator's signs read: "Resist the Coup," "Hate will tear us apart" and "F-Elon not my president" referring to Trump's felony record and Elon Musk's unelected status.

Speakers urged the public to stand united, continue pressure on elected officials, and demand a fair and accountable government.

"Don't panic, and don't quit!" said Sen. Jesse Kiehl, D-Juneau, speaking to the crowd. "It's coming at us shot after shot after shot, and that's a tactic. It causes confusion, and it causes exhaustion. ... That's why we're here today: We're here to call for change. We're here to call for controls. We're here to call for people, elected officials especially at the federal level, to stand up for the United States Constitution."
