# Commercial fisherman sentenced to 6 months in jail for taking an endangered sperm whale

JUNEAU, Alaska – A Southeast Alaska commercial fisherman was sentenced to six months in prison for falsifying fishing records in violation of the Lacey Act and illegally taking a sperm whale in violation of the Endangered Species Act.

According to court documents, between October and November 2020, Dugan Paul Daniels, 55, of Coffman Cove, knowingly submitted false records about his commercial fishing activities to make it appear that he lawfully caught sablefish, aka “black cod,” in federal waters on two separate occasions. An investigation revealed he harvested the fish illegally in State of Alaska waters, specifically, in Chatham Strait and Clarence Strait. The total market value of the illegally harvested fish was \$127,528.

Court documents further explain that, in March 2020, Daniels and three crew members were fishing for sablefish southwest of Yakobi Island in the Gulf of Alaska when they came upon a sperm whale. During the encounter, Daniels knowingly tried to take the endangered sperm whale by having a crewman shoot the whale multiple times and by trying to ram the whale with his fishing vessel. Court documents detail that the term “take” means to harass,

harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture or collect, or to attempt to engage in any such conduct. Daniels documented the encounter in writing and through text messages sent from a GPS communication device. Some of the messages stated he wished he “had a cannon to blow” the whale out of the water and that he hoped “to be reeling in a dead sperm whale.”

Court documents explain that the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration does not know if Daniels succeeded in killing the whale, as no sperm whale carcass was reported in Southeast Alaska in 2020.

On June 6, 2024, Daniels pleaded guilty to one count of Lacey Act violation for false labeling and one count of Endangered Species Act violation for an illegal take. In handing down the sentence, the Court called Daniels’ actions “deliberate” and emphasized Daniels’ 20 years of experience as a commercial fisherman and the importance of deterring others from similar conduct because of the threat it poses to the sustainability of Alaska’s marine resources.

At sentencing, the Court also ordered Daniels to pay a \$25,000 fine

and serve three years on supervised release, with a one-year commercial fishing ban while on supervised release and 80 hours of community work service as special release conditions.

“Though he had been a fisherman for over 20 years, Mr. Daniels showed a blatant disregard for endangered animals, the laws that protect them and the regulation of commercial fishing,” said U.S. Attorney Michael J. Heyman of the District of Alaska. “Let this sentence serve as an example that these violations will not go unpunished. Falsifying recordkeeping and reporting documents has a direct effect on sustainable fishery management and interferes with Alaska’s ability to ensure species are not overfished. Our office, in collaboration with our wildlife law enforcement partners, is committed to holding all individuals to the same standards and will continue to seek criminal sanctions for wildlife crimes.”

“Mr. Daniels believed that he could use deception to escape the consequences of his actions,” said Benjamin Cheeseman, Assistant Director of NOAA’s Office of Law Enforcement, Alaska Division. “Anyone who violates the laws that protect Alaska’s marine resources

will face serious repercussions. We remain committed to holding individuals accountable for these offenses.”

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Office of Law Enforcement investigated the case.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Ainsley McNerney and Andrea Hattan, Special Assistant U.S. Attorney/NOAA Office of General Counsel Enforcement Attorney, prosecuted the case.

# Anchorage senator proposes ‘homeless bill of rights’ for Alaskans

Over the past two years, nearly 100 homeless Alaskans died on the streets of Anchorage.

This week, Anchorage Democratic Sen. Elvi Gray-Jackson introduced legislation that seeks to codify the rights of homeless Alaskans, including the right to take shelter in a public place as long as doing so doesn’t obstruct traffic.

“Mine (bill) doesn’t say ‘homeless bill of rights,’ but that’s what it’s basically about,” Gray-Jackson said by phone on Friday.

“What the bill would do is ensure that individuals experiencing homelessness are not denied access to essential services such as medical care, clean and safe living conditions, and equal opportunities for employment” just because they’re homeless, she said.

Last year, a former homeless man-turned-advocate named TJ Beers traveled to the Alaska Capitol to urge lawmakers to pass a “homeless bill of rights” in order to keep homeless Alaskans from being unnecessarily harassed by civil authorities.

Rhode Island, Connecticut and Illinois have already enacted laws affirming that homeless residents have equal rights to housing, medical care, movement and private property.

Last year, Gray-Jackson said, she wasn’t in a position to answer Beers’ request, but this year, she could make it happen.

“When I tell somebody I’m going to do something, I keep my word,” she said.

Gray-Jackson, a former member of the Anchorage Assembly, said that during her time in that role, she made a point to visit homeless camps “because I wanted them to know that

I’m their legislator, and I represent them, too.”

Anchorage’s many homeless encampments are a hot topic in the community, and the city has been in several legal disputes about whether it has the power to remove those encampments.

Gray-Jackson said she doesn’t believe her bill would stop the city from clearing camps.

She said she doesn’t agree with people who say they’re going to “solve homelessness.” Instead, she said, “what we’re going to do is mitigate homelessness and make the situation better for all.”

# Anchorage judge dismisses lawsuit challenging trans-Alaska gas pipeline on climate grounds

An Anchorage Superior Court judge has dismissed a lawsuit challenging the proposed trans-Alaska natural gas pipeline as incompatible with the state constitution.

The suit, filed last year, alleges that the founding laws of the Alaska Gasline Development Corp. are incompatible with the Alaska Constitution’s guarantee of equal access to natural resources because the liquefied natural gas pipeline would result in so much climate change that it would destroy access to fish and wildlife.

The state had moved to dismiss the lawsuit, and the plaintiffs made a counter-motion, leading Judge Dani Crosby to rule on summary judgment.

In her ruling Tuesday, Crosby

sided with the state of Alaska, whose attorneys had argued that the lawsuit is substantially similar to previous cases decided by the Alaska Supreme Court.

In a written statement, the law firm Our Children’s Trust — which has been representing the plaintiffs — said it would appeal Crosby’s decision to the Alaska Supreme Court. When the lawsuit was filed, the eight plaintiffs ranged in age from 11 to 22.

“Today’s ruling is a clear miscarriage of justice with enormous implications. Alaska’s Constitution expressly guarantees equal access to and sustainable yield of the critical natural resources Alaska’s youth need to sustain their lives, health, and cultures,” wrote attorney Andrew Welle for the plaintiffs. “Today’s decision eviscerates these protec-

tions by placing not only the Alaska LNG Project but all natural resource management decisions beyond review by Alaska’s Courts, upending decades of precedent.”

The AKLNG project envisions a pipeline running from the North Slope to Cook Inlet, with industrial-scale facilities at either end to handle the natural gas. Construction work on the pipeline has yet to commence due to a lack of funding.

The Alaska Department of Law, which represents the state in the case, did not have an immediate comment on the ruling.
